Oregon Ballet Theatre presents Face to Face Three powerful works to celebrate human connection and the return to live performance

This fall Oregon Ballet Theatre (OBT) returns to the Keller Auditorium with Face to Face, a program of three powerful works: George Balanchine's iconic *The Four Temperaments*, Ben Stevenson's passionate *Three Preludes*, and a world premiere from Jennifer Archibald that aspires to sculpt the clouds.

"After 18 months away from our home, we are thrilled to be coming face-to-face with our audience again" says Interim Artistic Director Peter Franc. "For this highly-anticipated return to live performance, we bring three works that celebrate our humanity – revealing our passions, our desires, and our dreams through the unique expression of dance."

Last performed in 2010, OBT is thrilled to return one of George Balanchine's masterpieces, *The Four Temperaments*, to the Keller Auditorium. The work is loosely based on the ancient notion that human disposition is formed from a mix of four personality types – melancholic, sanguinic, phlegmatic, and choleric. But as with all things Balanchine, the ballet is ultimately an expression of the pure possibility and joy of dancing.

Balanchine Trust coach, and the cofounder of Pacific Northwest Ballet, Francia Russell returns to stage *The Four Temperaments* which features the entire company, including the debut of OBT's <u>many new dancers!</u>

An internationally acclaimed ballet comes to Portland Ben Stevenson's *Three Preludes* | Music: Sergei Rachmaninoff

OBT audiences fell in love with Ben Stevenson's *Cinderella*. Now the company presents Stevenson's more intimate exploration of romance, *Three Preludes*. Created in 1969, the work was an immediate critical and popular success and has been performed by companies around the world including American Ballet Theatre, and Paris Opera Ballet.

The ballet captures a cautious studio flirtation between two dancers which transforms into passion – their flowing movements increasing in speed and intensity as they are swept away by their love and the music of Rachmaninoff's Preludes performed by a solo pianist. OBT is delighted to bring this intimate yet powerful work to Portland.



A world premiere comes to shine in the Keller Jennifer Archibald's *SculptedClouds* | Music: Dead Can Dance, Roger Goula

SculptedClouds is an otherworldly exploration of man's relationship with nature from rising star Jennifer Archibald. Dancers reach for the sky in soaring lifts set to the ethereal beat-driven music of Dead Can Dance and Roger Goula. But the clouds are beyond them – boundless, airy, and free – and will not be controlled.

Last June OBT previewed *SculptedClouds* at OBT LIVE an outdoor event with limited capacity and restricted production value - except for the dramatic natural backdrop of the sky and sunset. OBT is eager to bring this haunting and ethereal work to its full brilliance on the Keller stage.
